Kia ora

I refer to your official information request dated 3 December 2024 for information on the impacts of the new Government speed setting rule.

The information you have requested is outlined below in red text.

- Any costs modelled or actualised necessary to meet new requirements under the Government's new Land Transport Rule: Setting of Speed Limits 2024
Tararua District Council had not yet implemented any speed changes as a result of the 2022 rules. This is due to the draft advise coming out at the point we were seeking to start the implementation.
We are currently reviewing the previous plan, and are working out the impacts of the changes. This is yet to be finalised, but it appears to be in the order of an additional \$30,000. We won't know the actual figure until early February.
- Any crashes, deaths and serious injuries modelled as a result of speed limit changes to meet requirements under the Government's new Land Transport Rule: Setting of Speed Limits 2024
No data is available, as no changes have yet been made.
- Any crashes, deaths and serious injuries modelled from changing to the previous speed rule - Land Transport Rule: Setting of Speed Limits 2022
Not applicable as no changes had been made. We are not aware of any Deaths or Serious Injuries in the zones identified in our proposed changes in line with the 2022 rule.
- Any submission your organisation prepared for the consultation on the draft Land Transport Rule: Setting of Speed Limits 2024, and any feedback otherwise given to the Ministry of Transport, Waka Kotahi, the Minister of Transport or his office on the Rule or the new approach to setting speed limits.
We have not lodged a submission.
